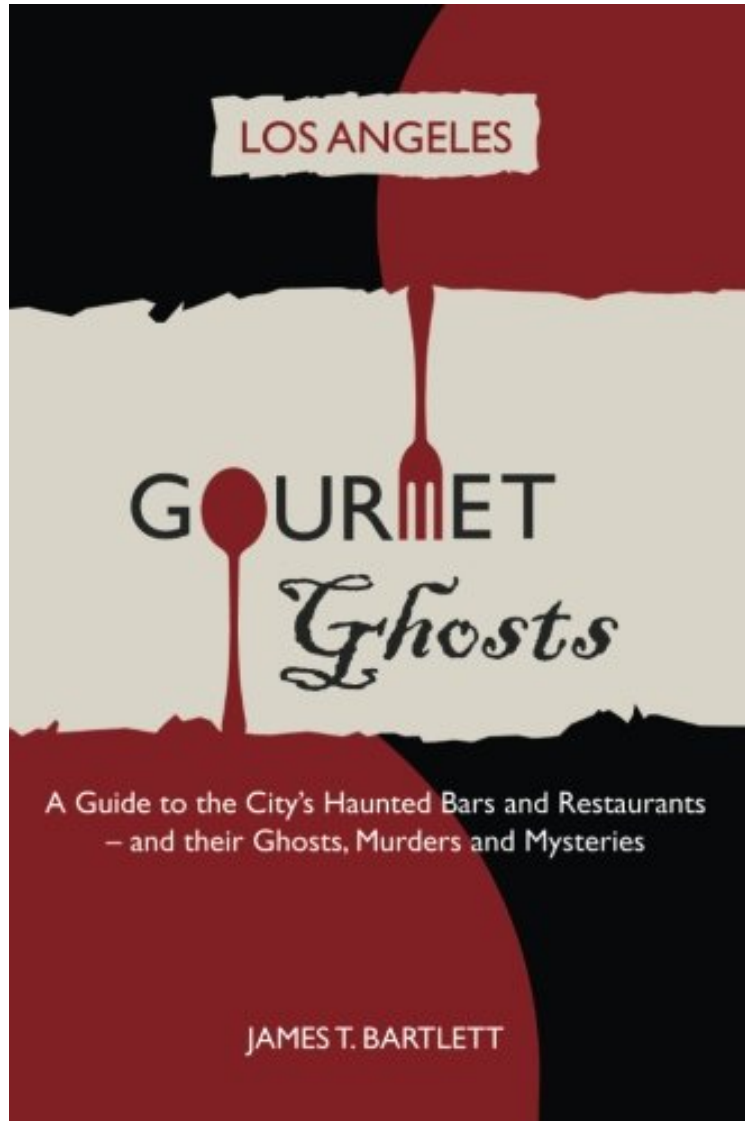

Gourmet Ghosts - Los Angeles is a fun history/mystery food guide that features 274 pages of ghosts, murders and odd events at over 40 bars and restaurants in Hollywood, West Hollywood Beverly Hills, Mid-City, Downtown, Westside Beaches and Off The Menu. Illustrated with photos, newspaper clippings, eyewitness accounts and never-before-published pictures and stories (as well as food/drink ideas), it's a look into L.A.'s past that learns many of the tales are based on real events: Glover's Ghost at Yamashiro, La mujer sin cabeza (the Headless Woman) at Musso Frank, The Night Watchman at Springs Arts Tower, Millie at the Paradise Cove in Malibu, and James Z. Oviatt, still haunting the building that killed him.
