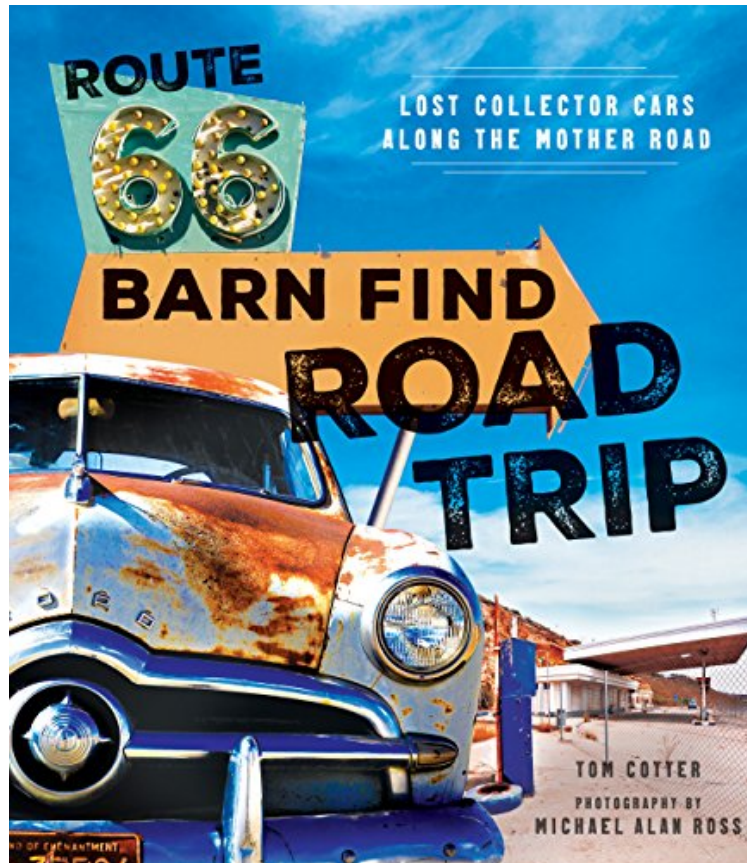

Tom Cotter spent two weeks on Rt 66 tracking down relics. I can tell you there is never enough time for Rt 66. Everything takes longer than you imagine, and abandoned cars are EVERYWHERE. He doesn't even scratch the surface of the journey. Many towns are even passed over, as he often lingers at length in one place. The upside to the book is the stories of the people he meets. The cars themselves spin unique Rt 66 and automobilia tales. Really, the people and the cars can speak for themselves. SOOOOO- Tom Cotter, the US guru of abandoned vehicles injects his story way too much into the book. Once again we get photos of his yellow woody, tales of him wanting to buy certain cars, side bars about people unrelated to Rt 66 (but filming for Youtube) rushing to make their flights. There is so much story to be told of the cars

and Rt 66 itself, take your ego out of the damn book, and let the story unfold in its own way. Such problems as this cause the text to come off disjointed. There aren't even enough rusted cars either. He visits several locations where there are hundreds, even thousands of cars, and you only get a handful of photos. Not only that, the photo quality isn't even great in terms of composition. Too many closeups, not enough wide angle perspective photos of the whole vehicle. We really can't "see" the car. Many of the photos present any affiliation with RT 66 at all. They could be relics anywhere. It's clear they had a great time traveling the road finding old cars, and some of the vehicles and stories he uncovers are very very unusual and interesting.
