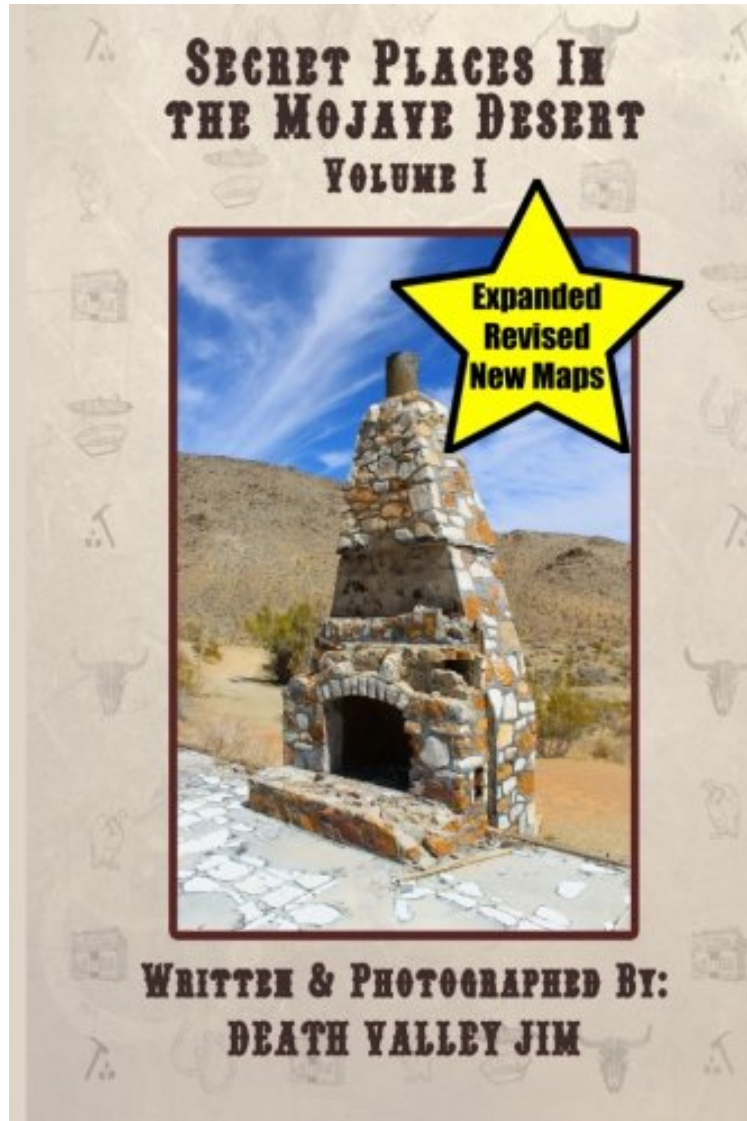

For all books: GPS coordinates and a map are given for each site; a brief description of each site often well researched is given along with photos; information related to safety, and etiquette to observe when visiting cultural resources, etc., is offered. Lacking for all his books: More information on locating these places should be given. What USGS map is used and what scale? What is the scale used for his map? Regarding some of the sites: Do you need high-clearance? 4WD? (Could my old Subaru make it?)
