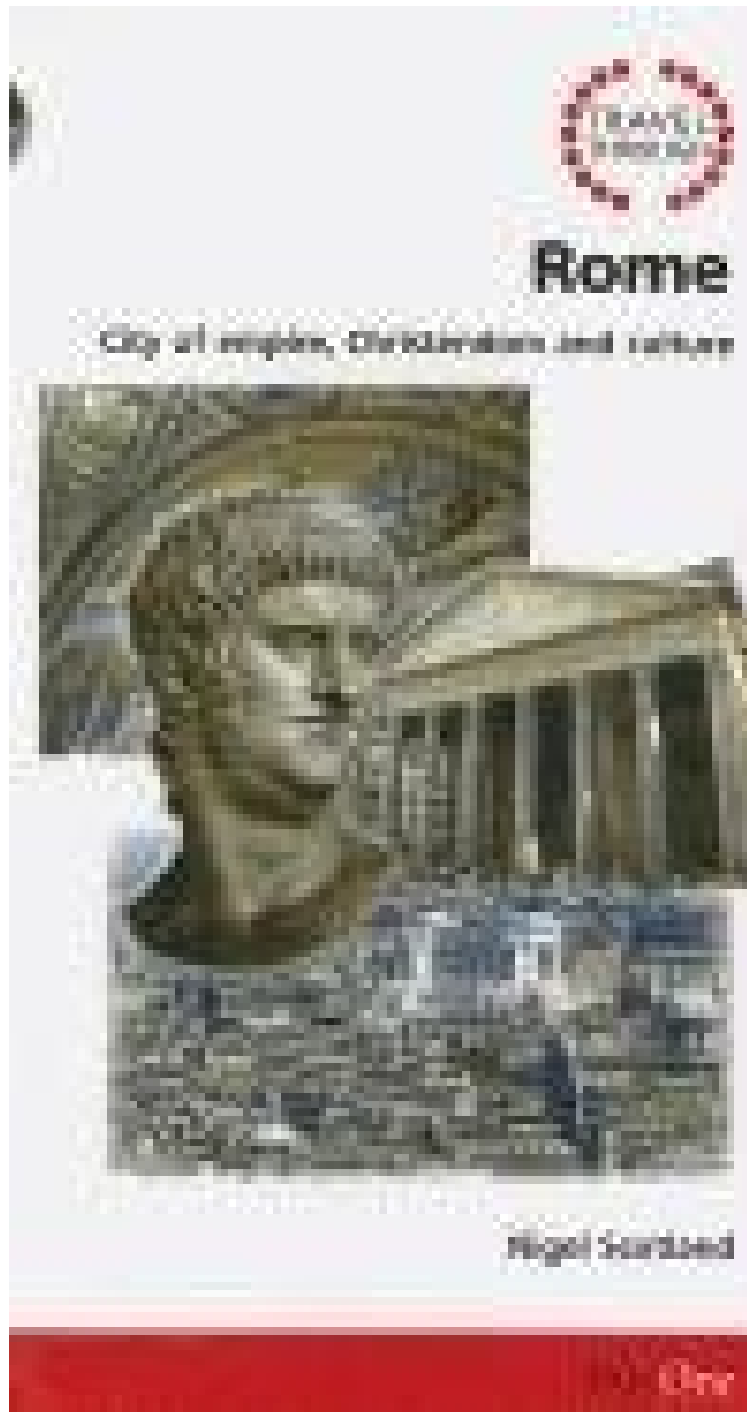

As with all the titles in this series, the booklet is lavishly illustrated and indexed, containing an introduction to the features of the modern and classical city of Rome, contrasting the Ancient Empire with the modern Italy and providing valuable timelines to help us understand and apply history in context. This is as good a compact guidebook as you are likely to find on Rome and as a starter book on the city, its culture, its highlights and its history, it stands as being a portable illustrated book, strong on research and containing relevant and appropriate graphics content. Practical in outlook, it has information for the traveller in Rome and useful maps and illustrations to help you find your way around the city and area. It is an enjoyable educational and practical guide which is a welcome addition to the series.

Rome lies at the heart of the Christian faith being the place where the two great apostles, Peter and Paul, both taught and died. Since the sixth century AD, books have been written about this wonderful city with the aim of encouraging pilgrims to come and draw spiritual strength from its history, culture and worship. One of the aims of this travel guide is to convey something of the challenge and inspiration of the early Christian communities of Rome.

About the Author Nigel Scotland has spent the greater part of his life lecturing in church history at what became the University of Gloucestershire. He has been involved in church planting and since 2006 has taught theology students of Bristol Baptist College and Trinity College Bristol.
