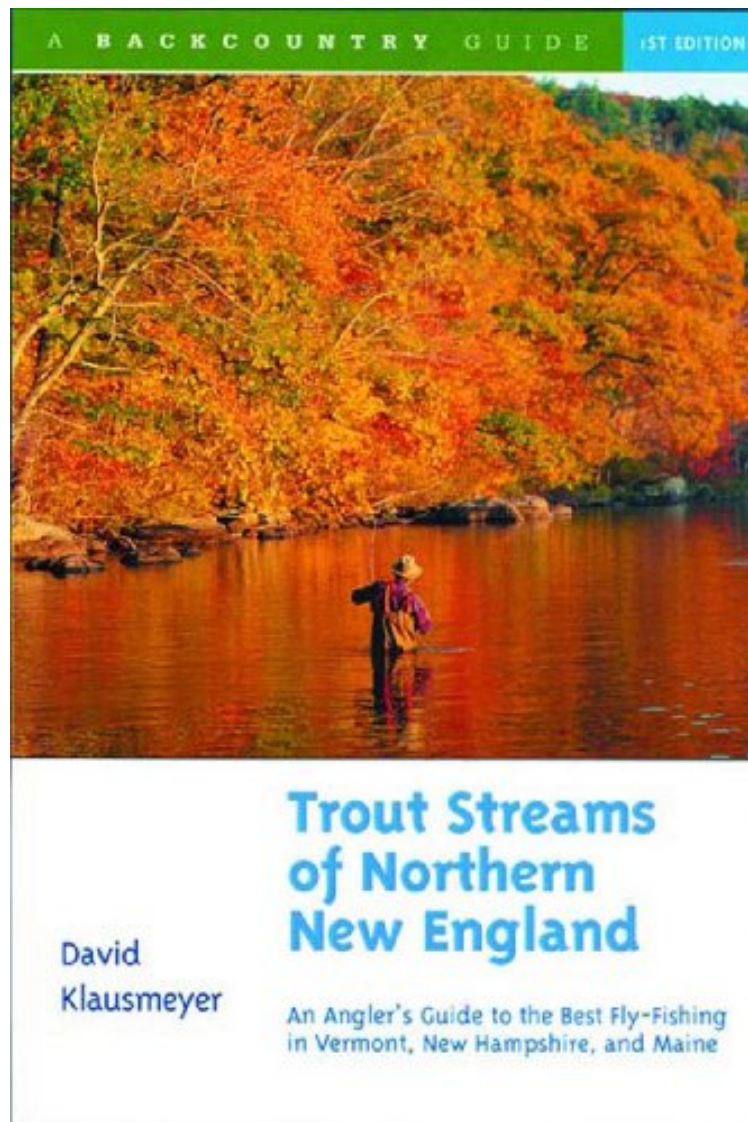

It became my Bible for fly fishing, so when the opportunity came to fish Vermont, I purchased the Northern New England edition. It is written in the same "fireside chat" way as the first book (different author) and gives truly great nuts and bolts information. It tells you where to park, flies to use, precautions to take, and regulations to observe. It includes simple maps to read, and my books are blotted with color coded markings where I highlight maps and paragraphs as I read. These books are written as though you're sitting around a fire with the author and he's telling you what you need to know to catch fish all day long, all year long, on almost any stretch of water. This book is a must for planning any northern New England fishing trip. HOWEVER.... This book is a 1st edition, copyrighted in 2001. In 2011, Hurricane Irene changed the face and body of many rivers throughout NNE. The information in the book is still incredibly valuable, but I strongly encourage you to talk to local fly and sporting shops. The rivers rose and became so violent they swept entire houses down stream, changing the flow and course of many rivers. Some rivers have new regulations including catch and release sections, children only sections, and creel/size limits, that are not listed in the book. I only learned these by talking to locals. Actually, I would normally rate this book a 4 but I thought the previous rating showing a 2 was too low. I found the book to be very helpful. Not being familiar with Maine, VT, or NH, I was able to quickly determine not just where to fish but where not to fish. The book is targeted more toward fly fishermen (I am one of those) and it lists what hatches are on the stream. A familiar fly fisherman knows roughly what month such hatches are around.
