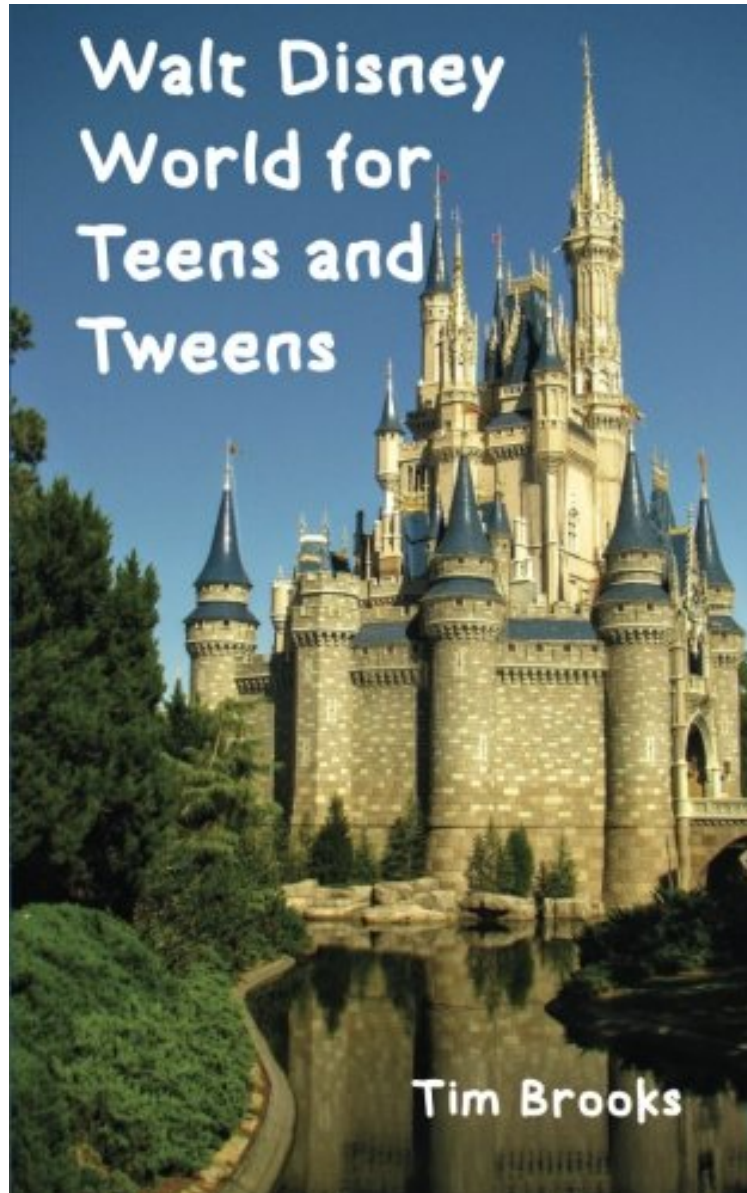

This is a good Disney guide book for its target audience of teens and tweens. As a mom of three boys in this age range, I'm certain that this book will hold their interest and provide helpful suggestions for trip-planning, all without talking down to them. I love the fact that this book offers suggestions for kids to help with the planning/budgeting process, which can be pretty extensive before a Disney World trip. It's nice to involve the kids in this part of the vacation so they can truly appreciate the money being spent. As a homeschooling mom, I also love the "educational slant" this book provides in relation to the various Disney attractions. Although our family has been to Disney World several times, the author brought up some educational opportunities in the parks that I'd never thought of. While this book has good, solid writing, the editing seemed a bit rushed (a few too many typos). Also, it would have been nice to have a bit of a summary - maybe one last "educational slant" or final question - at the end, rather than just ending the book with resort information. All in all, a very good guide book that will appeal to tweens and teens.
